at the computer, it is meant for the whole family and in many cases the whole cottage. As I listen and ask other organizations I get the distinct feeling they members and are going back to printed

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We need your input as to how you want to receive communications from your association. BRLA has been around for 98 years and is here to serve and protect the lake by representing and presenting the views of those on and around the lake. We can't do that if we aren't in communication with you. Yes computers, tablets, ipads and iphones are quick and inexpensive, but if you don't read the whole message they are useless. Please provide us with your feedback. Specifically as to how you would like to receive your communication from your association. Emails, facebook, twitter, newsletter via Canada Post? Send your comments to brla@brla.on.ca.

The RLEF has worked very hard to produce a new mailing list by cottage access road. This is great because one of the programs we hope to implement over the winter is a "Road Champion" program, which I spoke about in my initial message. (In case you didn't receive that message: the program is intended to identify an individual on each road to be an ambassador on behalf of the BRLA and the local road association in identifying who has left the road and who has moved onto a property as well as individual changes. In a number of incidences we have continued to mail material to the parents when other members of the family have taken over the cottage. In many respects a form of "Welcome Wagon"). The strength and existence of the Association is based on its membership, and without members, we can't run and fund the main programs of the association: the shoal markers and communicating activities involving the environment and ecology of our lake. It is hard to believe that we have 600 boats for the fireworks and have to work very hard to get 300 members. As your association we get contacted by other organizations and groups seeking our (your) input: organizations such as Parks Canada, Rideau Valley Conservation, Federation of Ontario Cottagers (FOCA), the local municipalities and study groups such as "Rideau Corridor Landscape Strategy Steering Committee, Lake Links, and Rideau Heritage Waterways Initiative. You want representation at the table when people start proposing new taxes and charges. If you and your neighbours at the cottage/lake home/cabin or whatever you have at the lake are members then we can communicate to you what is happening and how it may affect you. Take the opportunity to have proactive representation.

As members you may want to talk to your neighbours about joining as you pay for one of your associations most important programs: "THE SHOAL BUOYS. We had one suggestion that we use camouflage paint and give out special glasses for boat operators so only they could see the buoys, don't worry we didn't find the paint or the glasses. To pay for that program we need memberships and donations to the Rideau Lakes Environmental Fund (RLEF).

Okay so lets talk monies, your association receives some of its operating funds from your membership and some from the (RLEF), both sources are very important to the survival of your association. RLEF is a registered body with Revenue Canada who can give tax receipts for donations; BRLA cannot give tax receipts for your membership. This past summer the BRLA board suggests that rather then have members donate to the Board's environmental committee, donations for environmental activity should be made out to RLEF. (Under Income Tax regulations a third party cannot forward the funds and then give a tax receipt, the donation has to be made directly the receiving party.)

I am hoping that we can mail future editions of "Driftwoods" to all our existing members and those nonmembers who are on the new RLEF list. We will be including a membership renewal form and enclosing the new pamphlet that the RLEF has produced.

2014 SKATE THE LAKE

If you are at, or need an excuse to go to the cottage in late January, plan on attending the 10th annual Skate the Lake held in Portland January 24 to 26, 2014. This year Skate the Lake (STL) is hosting the North American Speed Skating Marathon over three days. The majority of the races and related activities being held on Saturday January 25th.

MARINE SAFETY

The 2013 Boating season was relatively safe for those using the Lake. The water levels were high for the better part of the season and while this is good for boaters, it did cause some concern from low lying cottagers. During the last little while the water level has fallen very quickly.

Lamont Brown, who for 37 years looked after our 105 Buoys, has retired this spring. In his place we have Steve Magee. Steve is now taking care of the buoys and removed them from the Lake once the locks closed on October 13, 2013. He will deploy them prior to the opening of the locks, approximately the May 24, 2014 weekend.



Boaters and cottages may have noticed that OPP were seen more frequently on the Lake this year. This is due to part of the Marine Division being moved to the Smiths Falls detachment. Hopefully Safetymatters

we will see them around even more next season. Boaters and cottagers are reminded to have all the required safety items and their PCO Card with them when out on the water.


LAKE DINNER DANCE

Rideau Candied Walnuts

INGREDIENTS

1 pound walnut halves
1 cup white sugar
2 teaspoons ground
cinnamon
1/4 teaspoon salt
6 tablespoons milk
1 teaspoon vanilla
extract 1 pound walnut

1 cup white sugar
2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
1/4 teaspoon salt
6 tablespoons milk
1 teaspoon salt
6 tablespoons milk
1 teaspoon salt



INSTRUCTIONS

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Spread nuts in a single layer over a baking sheet. Roast for approximately 8 to 10 minutes, or until the nuts start to turn brown and the smell of roasting nuts fills the kitchen.

Stir together sugar, cinnamon, salt, and milk in a medium saucepan. Cook over medium-high heat for 8 minutes, or until the mixture reaches the soft ball stage of 236 degrees F (113 degrees C). Remove from heat, and stir in vanilla immediately.

Add walnuts to sugar syrup, and stir to coat well. Spoon nuts onto waxed paper, and immediately separate nuts with a fork. Cool, and store in airtight containers.

How do we establish a youth group with such sporadic attendance? How do we stay in touch?


For The summer of 2014 we are planning for regular meetings on Wednesdays, at 2:30.

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BIG RIDEAU LAKE MEMORIES PART III

Clarence Chapman who had the cottage next to us, now owned by the Cully family, had made signs that said "Sound Horn - Curve & Hill" and he posted these all along the road out to the highway. Chapman drove a Durant car, very similar to the Graham Page. He had a trailer and carried all their belongings in it. During the war when gas was rationed he burnt coal oil in his car.

Dad never drove until 1928 when he bought a new Chandler sedan. We had an old Dodge previously a 1920 version. I never remember it on the road, when I was a little boy it was always parked in our back yard at home (Glen Avenue in Ottawa). and I used to play in it while it was rusting away.

My Uncle Ivor and Aunt Toots and cousin Audrey would drive up with us. Audrey and I sitting on two kindergarten chairs in the back of the Chandler. Around this time the Reece's bought the cottage next door to us from the Thurston's. They continued to drive with us as Uncle Ivor did not drive. In 1930 he bought a Buick sedan and learned to drive. You could always tell when he was coming as he leaned on the horn most of the way in the back road.

Around this time Chandler went out of business. Dad thought that he may not be able to get parts for our car so he traded it in for a 1929 Studebaker "president 8" a great car. Dad used to let me steer it on the way to the lake. It was the first of 4



Studebakers that we would own.

As long as I can remember we always had a supply boat coming from Smiths Falls every day.



Captain Davis, a retired sea captain had an old steam boat, the Victoria. He would dock at Richie's dock (now Carmichael's) two doors from The Pines. We would buy our supplies from him. The Victoria also carried

passengers who would come to Smiths Falls by train and they would be dropped off at their destination along the lake.

In the 1930's he retired the old steam boat and bought a former 1000 Islands tour boat and renamed it Vic II. The front of the boat was set up as a store the remainder was for passengers. The Vic would dock at Ritchie's one day and at our dock the next day. People from the Islands would row over and get their supplies. You could order your meat from Captain Davis and he would deliver it to you the following day.

The boat would dock in Portland and then make stops at the Islands before returning to Smiths Falls. You always knew when the boat was coming as you could hear the siren long before it arrived. I used to stand on the dock and watch for it coming around the point past the north end of Tar Island. When my



uncle Ivor built his boathouse it blocked out the view.

On Thursdays the Vic would run an excursion to Westport and we would take the trip once a year. It would make its last stop in German Bay (now Briton Bay) and then head up to Narrows Lock. As kids we enjoyed riding on the top of the boat and our treats would be handed up to us. My favourite drink was cream soda.

The Vic had some competition. For a few years there was another supply boat the "Valkyrie" a


smaller boat similar to the Vic, which also serviced the cottages.

Sim Scouvil who ran a grocery store in Portland had a boat and his two sons, Limmy and Tom, would deliver groceries to the cottagers. There were other attempts to run supply boats but I do not remember too much about them.
