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

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

PAINT AND VARNISH STRIPPER

Choosing a low toxin option

It is easy to make comments and jokes when it comes to paint and varnish stripper. What I've learned is Methylene Chloride paint strippers are no

- laughing matter and major Canadian retailers have voluntarily removed them from the shelves. Prior to any project educate yourself on the products you
- intend to use. Find out the health risks, what the safety precautions are, and how
- to safely store the products. All this info is readily available on manufactures websites.
- Currently in the shop I am restoring a 1953 22' Shepherd. The topsides, deck and transom needed to be stripped to wood. The question was heat gun and
- scraper or chemical strip? After testing a couple areas with a heat gun, the mystery finish gave off a nasty smell and immediately turned to a gum like jelly
- straight out of a Sci Fi movie. The next test was with paint and varnish stripper,
- the mystery finish stripped away with a couple applications. It was clear chemical stripper was the most efficient way to get the job done.
- I contacted my supplier to order my go to brand of Methylene Chloride heavy body paint stripper. "Sorry Mike, we don't carry that anymore. We were told by
- head office to no longer sell it." That was enough for me to find out why.
- The chemical known as Methylene Chloride (or dichloromethane) is added in
- very high concentrations to conventional paint strippers. Dangers include, inhalation of vapors that can kill you, blindness if swallowed, eye and skin
- irritant. It is linked to over 50 deaths in the USA. In 2017 this led to a campaign
- to have Methylene Chloride strippers removed from retail shelves across the USA. Canadian retailers were soon to follow.
- Knowing this, I was ready to try less toxic options with product names starting or ending with Bio, Eco, Green, New generation, Ez. All available at your local
- marine, hardware or paint store, choose one that will suit your planned restoration as all are different. What I learned about using these products was be
- patient, 10 coats of varnish weren't put on in a day! Take your time; read the
- instructions and make sure to put enough on, let the stripper do the work as it
- will most likely take 3-4 applications to remove the varnish, if it dries too fast, work in sections and cover with clear plastic for 20 minutes to soften varnish.
- With a medium bristle brush the low toxin stripper was very effective pulling stain out of the wood. In the end I was surprised how well it worked. Moving
- forward our shop will no longer use Methylene Chloride paint and varnish
- stripper, making it safer for everyone.
- In closing here are a few general practices when using paint and varnish stripper:
- Read the label for instructions and precautions.
- Work in a well-ventilated area.
- Wear goggles, fumes can enter eyes behind safety glasses
- Use chemical resistant gloves, stripper will melt through latex or nitrile gloves No exposed skin, shop coat or disposable coveralls
- Appropriate footwear is a must
- Fresh water source, follow first aid instructions to neutralize stripper on skin Respirator, follow manufacture recommendation

Planes, Trains, Automobiles and Boats Our first trip to the ACBS Sunnyland Boat Show in Tavares, Florida

Before owning antique and classic boats and joining the Manotick Classic Boat Club I had heard of the ACBS Sunnyland boat show in Tavares Florida. I fondly remember listening to Jim Potter's stories about the show and the St John's river cruise during some of my many visits to his shop while having my grandfather's duck boat restored. As I became more involved with antique wooden boats I continued to hear more and more about this show, it soon became a "must do" event. Escaping our winter weather in March, my wife Dawn and I headed south to Sunnyland.

Lake Dora is located in central Florida and is just one of the many interconnected fresh water lakes that make up the Harris Chain of lakes. The historic city of Tavares, America's Seaplane City, is located on the north west corner of Lake Dora and every March plays host to the ACBS Sunnyland boat Show.

The show ran Thursday through Sunday and we arrived at noon on a warm and sunny Friday. The waterfront where the show is held is quite beautiful. There are train tracks that run by the street and follow along the lakefront. The Royal Palm railway runs tourist excursions between Tavares and Mount Dora, about 10 km away. The train has beautifully restored 1940's passenger cars, and the historic Tavares train station is just steps from the entrance to the Sunnyland show.

Entering the gates to the waterfront park you are overwhelmed with a number of vendors. As we entered, we met our first of many familiar faces, Murray Gould. Murray was helping out with one of the vendors for the weekend. We made our way through the vendors and had a stop at the ships store then headed closer towards the lake to view the land displays of boats, outboards, amphicars and more. The in-water display had a very fine selection of antique and classic boats. Back up and across the street was the market place of boats for sale and on Saturday this area hosted the Festival of Speed car show. The car show had everything from new McLaren, Ferrari and Roll Royce automobiles to older Buicks, Corvettes and Desotos to name a few.


















The MCBC Family River Run & Picnic at Long Island Locks





Rhubarb Lunar Cake

With Spring arriving, it won't be too long before it is Rhubarb Season. This is a Rhubarb cake recipe that I took to one of the cruise nights last year at the Schofields.

Cake:

- ½ Cup Butter
- 1½ Cup Sugar Cream Butter and Sugar
- 1 Teaspoon of Vanilla
- 1 Egg

Beat in the egg and vanilla

- 2 Cups Flour
- 1 Teaspoon of Baking Soda
- ½ Teaspoon of Salt
- 1 Cup Buttermilk

Add all of the dry ingredients alternately with the buttermilk.

- 2 Cups of Rhubarb cut to ½" size
- 1 Tablespoon of Flour

Toss the Rhubarb with 1 Tbsp of flour Add to cake mixture Pour into a buttered 9 x 13 pan.

Topping:

- 1/4 Cup Butter
- 1 Cup Brown Sugar
- 2 tsp Cinnamon

Mix and sprinkle on the cake. Bake at 350 degrees for 40-45 minutes.

'THE COMMUTERS ARE COMING'



The waters around the estate of F. Scott Fitzgerald's Great Gatsby could boast of no finer craft than those that will be found upon the Rideau Canal and Dows Lake, Ottawa, Ontario this summer.

The watercraft of which we speak are known as Commuters, boats ranging anywhere from 38' to 76' in length. They were the personal property of such famous names as Vanderbilt, Morgan, Stroh, Ford and Kennedy. They were the aquatic thoroughbreds of America's rich and affluent entrepeneurs of the 1920's and 30's.

Once properly primped and groomed, these commuters playfully ransported their owners from country homes to prestigious offices in New York, Detroit and Boston. The gentle yet aggressive competitiveness hat existed between these 'commuting' captains of industry and inance resulted in the development of faster, more efficient, and more degant watercraft.

The onset of the depression and he outbreak of war caused many a levotee of the 'business boats' to lay up his craft in an effort to conomize or to volunteer her for

military service. Unfortunately, after the war, inflation, increasing pollution of urban waters and the appearance of freeways ended the commuting-by-water phenomenon.

(MCBC) at the 14th Annual Ottawa International Antique and Classic Boat Show, the weekend of August 12 and 13th, 1989.


Recently 'Nautical Quarterly'
